Title: Navigating the Difficult Waters of Clinical Supervision and Ethics.

Title: Counseling in a Culturally Diverse Society: Cultural Competencies.

Description: Individuals are shaped by their unique experiences in a cultural environment. Their behavior and practices, including their understanding and interpretation of behavior and events are shaped by their culturally unique environment. Individuals develop their worldviews shaped in their own cultural ethnic groups; however, there are individual differences within those groups that need to be considered. Thus, the Western assumptions, worldviews, and values oriented mental health practices cannot be applied universally. Eurocentric approach to counseling does not meet the needs of the people who are culturally different. Counselors need to be competent in the integrated knowledge and skill competencies to better serve this diverse population. First, counselor competency begins with counselor self-understanding in order to increase their awareness of cultural biases, stereotypes and unintentional behaviors. Second, acquire knowledge and understanding of the client's culture, by focusing on cultural specific behavior pattern and value systems. Third, the differences within the groups and individuals cannot be overlooked. There is no doubt counselors will be challenged to meet the needs of this diverse society. The complexity of diverse populations in this global society necessitates not only a multicultural approach to counseling but also counseling that is multi-dimensional in nature.
